If a program balks at those questions, probe further. If they respond to with examples and invite you to observe, that self-confidence normally shows real practice.

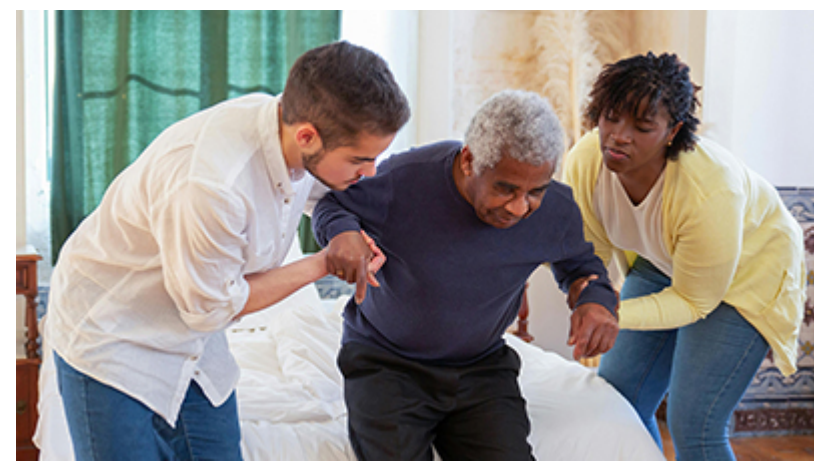
When habits challenge care
