That convenience is often the quiet benefit people notice after the work is done. Rekeying is also common after move-ins and move-outs because key control matters more than the physical age of the lock.

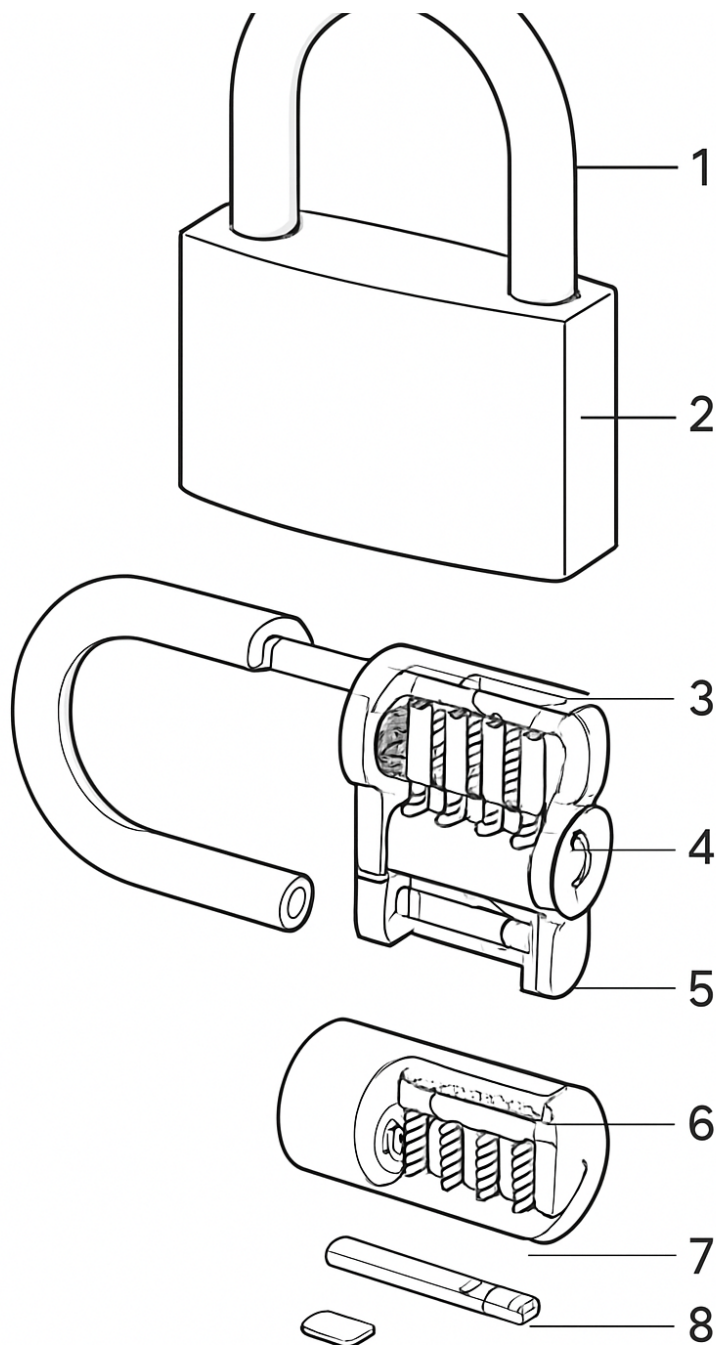
How pricing gets discussed
