

When a lock needs changing or a key refuses to cooperate, the timing feels immediate. 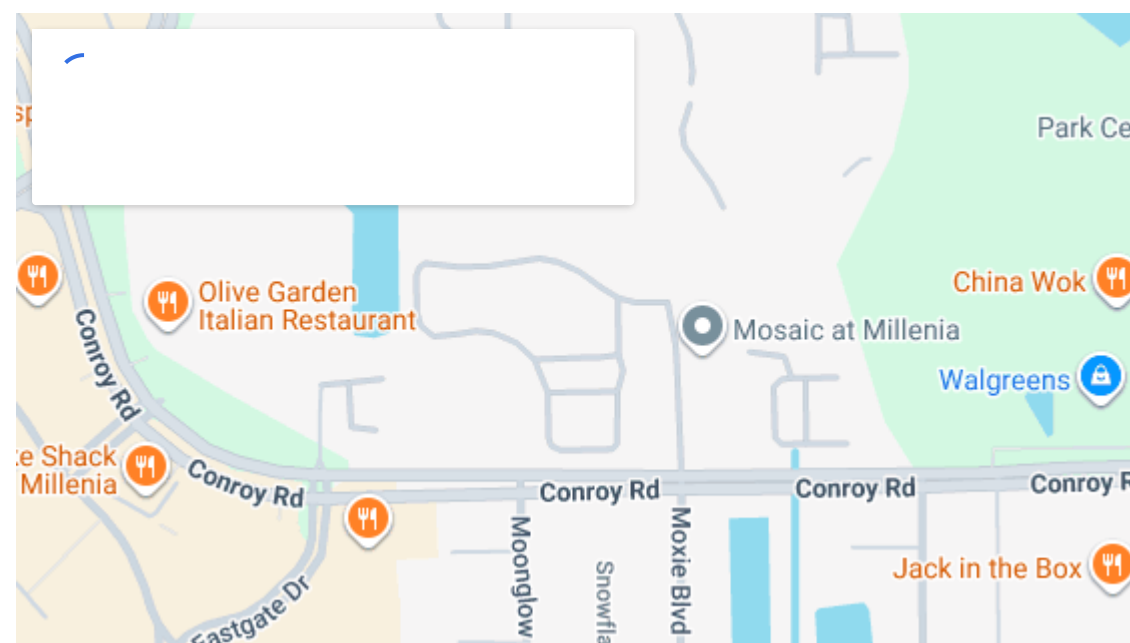
